

Frequency in the Majority

These charts display how frequently each justice voted in the majority in decisions filed during the period September 1, 1992, to August 31, 1993. The first chart includes all cases in which a justice voted (out of the total of 87 cases specified above), while the second chart includes only cases decided by split votes.
