Agreement Among Pairs of Justices

The following tables show the percentage of cases in which every possible pair of justices found themselves on the same side in a decision—either both in the majority or both dissenting. The first table covers all cases; the second table narrows its focus to cases in which decisions were not unanimous. When reading the <u>second</u> table, for instance, one finds that Justices Dallet and Karofsky voted together in 100% of the cases, while the figure for Justices Ziegler and Hagedorn was 50%.
